ELP's **Greg Lake** tours the UK in November (see greglake.com) and *RC* asked him what else he's up to. "I'm working on a record which was inspired by something that came to me when I was writing my autobiography, *Lucky Man*, which

is out later this year. I realised how cut off I had become from soul and gospel music, but during my formative years, as a singer/guitarist,

I often performed Motown or bluesinfluenced rock'n'roll. But once I became involved in progressive music, I hardly ever got to perform it again. I'd like to revisit that chapter

of my musical life and enjoy all the wonderful things it has to offer." If you could revisit any of your albums, what would you change

If you could revisit any of your albums, what would you change? I don't really like to revisit things because, at the time of making the records, I gave them everything I had in order to make them as

good as I possibly could. So they're a record of that particular moment in time. Whenever you go back to try to improve something, you may improve certain elements, but you'll almost certainly lose something into the bargain. You can never recapture that initial moment of

inspiration when everything was fresh and exciting, when the journey of discovery had just begun. And one's perceptions change over time, so you can never really view things with the same creative feeling. There's something magical

about original recordings which

cannot be replicated.
